

Beaver dams, please leave them alone! Someone keeps tearing out a small section of one, pointing the North Fork of Cache Creek right at the bank. At 11 cu.ft. per second it's not causing much harm but at 6 or 8 hundred cu.ft. per second it will erode the bank causing harm to several large red willow trees. Not to mention the brush left on the bank. What if someone uses it to start a fire? The creek bed is the only area that hasn't burned to the ground here. Also beaver ponds are being studied in relation to how they slow creeks and rivers down allowing more water to percolate down into the water table of aquifers. Drought may be with us a long time, so don't disturb the furry beasts, there helping to save water.

Mushrooms are starting to show themselves, DO NOT eat them! They will poison you or could even kill you!

Why close and lock the gate? Privacy! Every lot owner pays \$18 a year to support the Community Center and Campground. Do we leave the doors open at the Community Center? No, same with the campground. Please take the time to close and lock the gate.

As of December 20, 2022 rain fall near the Community Center measured 7.5", one third of what normal is.

The freeze, mid-December was down in the 20's and the frost was beautiful in the mornings sun, only to disappear as the sun warms the earth. Air quality, the people who control the burn permits want me to provide them with all assessor parcel numbers and physical addresses for each and include each and every parcel on the greenbelt/campground. This has led to procrastination on my part. My volunteer service to our community has suffered. Happy New Year!

WOLF CREEK FIREWISE by Win Cary

The Firewise volunteers are receiving requests for assistance from our neighbors. Now that we are getting rain (HOORAY), the work schedule will need be set around the weather. We will get the work done, but at a slower pace.

If you have an acre or more, we recommend that you get an Air Quality Control burn permit through Northshore Fire to legally dispose the tree and brush waste by burning. Air Quality Control is now requiring that you provide the address, the assessor's parcel number, and a printout of the parcel borders for the application review. Some of this information you can get from your property tax forms, the printout of the parcel borders can be found online at the Lake County CA GIS map, or a copy can be issued by the Recorder's Office in Lakeport.

At the Nov. Firewise meeting the volunteers voted to use the \$10,000 grant from Lake County to

purchase an equipment trailer and additional tools for our program. We will be having planning and procedures meetings for the volunteers. Our next meeting will be in January. All residents are welcome to these meetings at the Community Center. Future meetings will be posted on the "Wolf Creek Firewise Community" Facebook.

I cannot say it often enough - THANK YOU to the property owners that kept their property cleared and trimmed, and MANY, MANY THANKS to the volunteers. They are a fantastic group of people!

CANCELLED HOMEOWNER INSURANCE POLICIES by Win Cary

A number of property owners in Lake County have received notices that their insurance company is cancelling their homeowner policies at the renewal date. Insurance agents are being swamped by calls from unhappy property owners.

If you have received one of these cancellation notices you can ask your agent about the California Fair Plan for fire insurance on your home. This plan covers only fire insurance on your home, you will have to carry another policy to covers personal belongings and liability insurance. The agents will request pictures of your home on all four sides, including pictures of the roof, a picture of your house number that is attached to the house, and possibly pictures in the four directions from your house.

I hope this information will help you.
