WOLF CREEK FIREWISE - by Win Cary

The annual report to National Firewise has been submitted. Hopefully, Wolf Creek Firewise will receive a Certificate for 2026. During the Firewise fiscal year (November 2024 to October2025) 17 residents have reported their work hours, and Firewise volunteers have responded to 35 requests for help. The Firewise and resident's work totals include 1187.5 hours on 116 acres, removing 32,805 pounds of grass and tree waste. The combined cost for this effort has been \$9,803.81.

15 volunteers, and one guest, met on October 25 for a year-end meeting. Information from the Lake County Firewise Coordinator was shared and tentative plans for 2026 were made. Currently, there are no requests from residents for assistance, so the work crews are taking a seasonal break.

Thank you to the Northshore Fire Hogback Ridge wood chipping crew working in the valley clearing wood piles for neighbors. They worked in the area in September and October. If you have trimmed trees or cut down shrubs, sign up with Clear Lake Environmental Research Center (CLERC) at 707-245-9991 or email at chipping@clerc.co to have the wood chipping crew clear your property. CLERC received the grant funds to provide this service for all of Lake County, so they have to do the paperwork for the program.

PG&E UNDERGROUNDING WORK

It looks to me like PG&E undergrounding work is complete here in Spring Valley. Those 12 hour days last month did the trick! It's a shame their project didn't place all the power lines in the ground throughout the valley. It would have meant paving more of our roads. The areas that were affected still have the telephone lines on the old poles – no word on if AT&T will cut their lines over and remove those poles.

Don't you just love Fall? It's that beginning yo-yo thing – cool and misty one day and near 80's the next that's so crazy! I love hearing the acorns hitting the roof on their way to the ground and the deer seem pretty happy too. The acorns are falling. The Black Cottonwood, Red Willow and wild grape leaves are yellowing. The Oaks are turning brown, and all seasonal trees are going dormant. The North Fork of Cache Creek is down to 9.67 CFS. Indian Valley Reservoir storage is 194,969 ac ft. Clearlake is at 2.83 Rumsey, releasing 3.31 CFS with 38,541 ac ft available for irrigation.

This is a slow time of year for me, waiting for the green season. We have a new administrator at Special Districts. This means new rules for volunteering on the greenbelt. I do not quite understand why I need a background check to pick up trash but new boss, new rules! If approved, Cal Fire may be out to slash and burn, that is if I can get a burn permit. Time will tell.

CSA #2 ADVISORY BOARD - by Cindi Storrs

Meeting called to order at 7PM with the pledge of allegiance. Present were: Helen Mitcham, Joe Walz, Jim McDole, Ed Smith, Cindy Storrs Minutes of September meeting approved

Items not on the agenda

- Sterling reported that Sonoma County Clean Power is wanting to establish itself in Lake County. Although this is a subject that falls in the responsibility of the CSA#2, we will allow a very brief time at the next meeting for Sterling to report.
- Joe reports that he has completed the Volunteer paperwork for the county
- A resident wants to know if this same paperwork is required for Firewise volunteers? Directed her to Win Carry.

Projects:

- PG&E Undergrounding Status: They will be working daily (weather permitting) from 7a-7p through Oct 11 in the hope they can finish the project before the heavy rains come.
- Standby Fees any relief in sight?: per the ERTH meeting, Robin is working on reducing the stand-by fees as well as addressing if they might be used without a structure or permit in the works so residents can have fire prevention capabilities
- The Well Lab results?: How deep is the well? No boron in the recent test. Still running tests. Some problematic minerals found.
- Fence/ plant growth @ spillway: SD has identified the areas that need repair and will fix them.
- Hydrant Leaks Locks Meters: SD continues to address this issue. Chief Willie Sapeta (Lake County Fire) is assisting SD with this.
- Water Production Variance (current billing): Current variance is 41%. SD has identified an issue called "ghost lines" that are apparently old, original water lines that are not mapped, are connected to the water system, not metered and in fact are being used by residents and or are leaking. Joe reported one on his property. SD staff will map and cap them when they are found. When was the last time the water system was tested for asbestos? Are we a failing water system? Possibility of state assistance for rural/poor communities with failing systems.
- Lake recovery how do we get Army Corps to understand what we have and what we're doing?: A consultant has been offered to SD who has experience with ACOE and large projects. An extension on the project was granted.

For the good of the order:

- the money for the parking lot paving is in the bank. There is a possibility to pave a forgotten little section of Wolf Creek outside of the parking lot.
